## In Depth: CAHC Fall Show

The Fall Show of the Colorado Arabian Horse Club has gone on for over 50 years continuously. The locations have varied including Estes Park, the Adams County Fairgrounds, the PENROSE facility in Colorado Springs, the national Western complex, and more recently the Douglas County Fairgrounds in Castle Rock. Douglas County has hosted our Fall Show for 13 years. Karen Kerrick had been the show manager for many years but eventually moved to North Carolina. Since then, ourCAHC President, Jerry Martinez, has been the show manager with the assistance of his son Gary Martinez. This year we will have two judges: Sheri Odom from Lake Havisou and Gary Martinez from our own CAHC. The format of the show has changed quite a bit over the years. Back in 1970 the show hosted a number of halter classes and Futurity classes that included a generous Jackpot and payback. Those classes included two and three-year-old weanlings Jerry has seen the enthusiasm for breeding declined dramatically over the past 50 years. We still will have a number of halter and performance halter classes, but not as many as in years past. Decades ago we even had a number of youths breed and then show at our Fall Show. The decline in breeding has many factors. Economics is probably the biggest driving factor. Our CAHC membership has also declined quite a bit over the years. The cow horse classes have increased dramatically in popularity though. That and working Western classes. Jerry told me that the Fall Show used to include cutting. He thought that was a little too specialized and so the interest in that declined. However the cow classes with herd work have dramatically increased in popularity. Now we have a large number of women competing in the cow classes.

Jerry and Gary always have some amount of stress, wear and tear in renting the herd for the Fall Show. Last year they had not one but two vendors bailout very close to the day before that the herd was needed in Castle Rock. Heroically, they both prevailed and got the herd down to the Fairgrounds just-in-time.

The Douglas County Fairgrounds has made quite a few improvements over the years. At this time, it is the best facility for cow horse classes in the metropolitan area. Jerry told me a fascinating story that occurred about 15 years ago. The national Western complex is not so well equipped for cow classes. One of the cows literally escaped its pen at the national Western complex. It gave about 10 of our horse club members and five Denver squad cars a merry chase all over the metropolitan area including a couple of interstates. Lo and behold, no one happened to have a lasso.. That made the containment of the errant cow all the more challenging. As I understand, when the vendor took this particular . animal back home, it escaped its home ranch never to be seen again.

The Fall Show includes many of the equestrian classes that we all expect. We have included Ranch Riding for the fourth year now. Jerry has spiced things up for our horse club members with a pancake breakfast or sloppy Joe dinner in the past. The Fall Show is also the occasion for our annual election of officers and board members.

Strangles, otherwise known as equine distemper, is a very serious and highly contagious bacterial disease in horses. When a facility insists on a health certificate for a horse, this is one of the primary conditions the health certificate is screening for. Strangles is literally a strep throat for horses. The infection is caused by Streptococcus Equi, whereas strep throat in humans is caused by Streptococcus Pyogenes. The human form of strep is also known as group a beta hemolytic Streptococcus. At one time, strep throat in humans could be deadly without antibiotics. However it is probably more famous for its postinfection autoimmune diseases. Human strep throat can stimulate the body to attack itself in conditions such as rheumatic fever, rheumatic heart disease, kidney disease, rashes (Scarlet Fever) and neurological conditions such as Sydenham's Chorea. Chorea is Latin for dance. Pre-antibiotic strep throat victims could develop a compulsive, writhing, dance like movements that could last for months or years. These autoimmune conditions have largely disappeared with the advent of strep testing and antibiotics. The strep bacteria can cause visible pockets of infection in the tonsils called exudates. These rarely develop into true abscesses. Horses, on the other hand, are much more prone to deadly abscesses caused by the Streptococcus Equi. The condition is characterized by fever, fatigue, yellow or green nasal discharge, enlarged and abscessed lymph nodes, depressed behavior. Strangles is a reportable disease in the United States since 2017. Up to 40% of horses can be carriers of the StreptococcusEqui. About 8% of horses with Strangles succumb to the illness. Consequently, it is one of the deadliest illnesses that horses are prone to. Due to the abscesses and lymph node enlargement, pressure on the esophagus and trachea can prevent horses from taking in water and calories. Most horses with Strangles have very obvious signs and symptoms. However there is a small minority that are carriers without obvious signs of the disease. Transmission of this Streptococcus can be from direct horse to horse touching of their noses. The disease can be spread by fomites such as caretaker gloves and utensils. The purulence can be so abundant that a horse can aspirate the pus causing pneumonia. The Streptococcus can stimulate clotting factors in the blood (hyperfibrinoginemia) which can lead to thrombosis. The illness can progress into what is known as Bastard Strangles which is a disseminated form of the illness where the bacteria spreads and grows throughout the horses body.

As a result, abscesses may also form in the brain, abdomen, and lungs. The incubation period for Strangles is 3 to 14 days.

Treatment of Strangles varies quite a bit depending on how quickly the infection is spotted by caretakers. Antibiotics are most effective very early on. Once the abscesses form, the antibiotics are less effective. The abscesses often reach the skin and will literally drain. Once that occurs, the pus pockets can be irrigated with an iodine wash. Hot packs to the areas affected by abscesses can help the localized infection progress and drain. If the infection is allowed to progress to Bastard Strangles, the rate of mortality goes up dramatically.

The best prevention of Strangles is to isolate any horse coming into stables from a stables that is not well known. Quarantine for a couple of week can usually flush out any cases before allowing contact with the rest of the herd. Young horses are most susceptible to Strangles. Since the Streptococcus Equi is so ubiquitous, most older horses have had some exposure and therefore some immunity to the disease. There is a Strangles vaccine which appears to be about 50% effective. Most horses develop some immunity once they have contracted the illness. However this immunity is not complete, and horses can come down with Strangles more than once.
