Scholarship Opportunities

Arabian Horse Foundation

In a convenient one-stop shopping approach, the Arabian Horse Foundation allows students to fill out a single application that automatically makes them eligible for all memorial and regional scholarships. The Arabian Horse Foundation Scholarship Application deadline is April 1 of each year.

National Arabian Horse Judging Contest

Contestants in the National Arabian Horse Judging Contest at U.S. Nationals in October have the opportunity to win \$7,000 in total individual and team scholarship awards across the three divisions: 4-H/FFA, Junior AHA, and Senior AHA/Collegiate.

Burr Betts Memorial College Scholarship

Two scholarships of \$1,000 each to be awarded to two incoming college Freshmen or current undergraduate or graduate students, or to incoming or current students at a trade school or other post high school educational program of at least one year in length. Applicant must be a member of an AHA Region 8 affiliated club. Applicant must have completed at least 8 hours of volunteer service to Region 8, the affiliated club, or other equine organization in the year prior to application. Deadline is May 1.

The Arabian Horse Association

Arabian horses go quite a ways back in American history. The first notable example is in 1873. General US grant was taking a tour of the Middle East. In Turkey, Sultan Abdul Hammond II presented the General Grant two Arabian horses, one of which he renamed Egypt and became one of his favorite horses. Although Ronald Reagan was known to ride his horse at Camp David on a regular basis, Gen. Grant and Thomas Jefferson are the two presidents who are noteworthy in regards to their equestrian skills. Randolph Huntington imported two Arabian mares and two stallions in 1888 from England, beginning the first purebred Arabian breeding program in the United States. In 1893 at the Chicago world's fair, the Turkish exhibition presented 45 Arabian horses. Two of those Arabians became the foundation for the Arabian Horse Stud book of America. Homer Davenport imported more Arabians for breeding in 1906 shortly before the advent of the Arabian Horse Registry of America in 1908. Teddy Roosevelt was president at the time of the founding of the Arabian Horse Registry of America in 1908. Pres. Roosevelt was a noted equestrian including his famous charge up San Juan Hill on horseback. However it is unknown if he ever rode an Arabian purebred or not.

Due to the increased interest and importation of Arabian horses to America at the turn-of-the-century, the Arabian horse Registry of America was founded in 1908 in New York State under the auspices is of the Arabian Horse Club of America. One year later the horse club published its stud book formally recognized by the United States Department of Agriculture in 1909. In 1939 the registry moved from New York to Chicago. In 1950 the registry title was changed to the Arabian Horse Club Registry of America in the same year that the International Arabian horse Association was founded. The IAHA was founded as an offshoot of the Registry in order to develop and sanction competitions specifically aimed at the Arabian horse. In 1969 the Registry title was renamed to the Arabian Horse Registry of America at which time the organization moved from Chicago to Colorado. In 1984 the registry formally moved to the new Arabian Horse Center in Westminster Colorado. Some years later in 2003, the Registry re-united and merged with the International Arabian Horse Association to form what is now the Arabian Horse Association. The AHA moved its' offices to Greenwood Village from Aurora a few years ago, at which time the Registry relocated to the new campus from Westminster.

In 2002, an offshoot of the Arabian Horse Registry of America split off into its' own Purebred Arabian Trust. Since that time, the AHA and the PAT have been involved in a number of court hearings regarding the ownership and management of the registry software.

"The Purebred Arabian Trust (PAT) and the Arabian Horse Association (AHA) have been involved in a legal dispute primarily focused on the ownership and management of the technology and systems used for registering purebred Arabian horses. The dispute between the Purebred Arabian Trust (PAT) and the Arabian Horse Association (AHA) centers on the purebred Arabian horse registration system. PAT, formed in 2002 to protect purebred Arabian horse registration, retained ownership of the

registration technology and database in 2003 and licensed its use to AHA. The core conflict involves the ownership and operation of an updated registration system used by AHA since 2011. Following ransomware attacks on AHA in 2021 that impacted registration services, PAT claimed the registry was inoperable and demanded its return, citing a breach of the license agreement. AHA disputed this and refused, leading PAT to file a lawsuit in July 2021.

Prior litigation established that AHA was required to develop a functional registration system (PARS) that PAT would own and could use if AHA could not provide reliable services. PAT claims PARS is not functional, while AHA asserts the registry is operational. The AHA offers about 300 sanctioned competitions in the United States and Canada every year. The AHA has 15,000 members with more than 1 million registered Arabian, Half-Arabian, and Anglo-Arabian horses.

Med/Vet: West Nile Virus

The West Nile virus curiously affects only two species of mammals which are humans and horses. Lots of mammals can be infected with the West Nile virus but none really show the clinical syndrome that we see in humans and horses. There is a commercially available vaccine for horses which is probably a good idea since infection with this virus can cause up to 40% mortality. Humans that are infected can have up to 10% mortality usually is a result of developing and encephalitis that is uncommon but can be very deadly. The *Orthoflavivirus* is an RNA virus that includes a number of well-known tropical diseases including Zeke a, dengue fever, and yellow fever. The "flavi" in the virus name is Latin for yellow as in yellow fever. The yellow in this case comes from the jaundiced skin of victims of the yellow fever. Unfortunately, there is no human vaccine for the West Nile virus and there is no vaccine apparent on the horizon. The West Nile fever can include a variety of gastrointestinal, biliary, and even respiratory symptoms. However the most dangerous symptoms for humans and horses is when the disease progresses into encephalitis. Large numbers of mammals are infected with the West Nile virus but relatively few come down with obvious symptoms. Even some reptiles like alligators can be infected but do not show much of a clinical syndrome.

Many species of birds are prone to catching the West Nile virus. Crows in particular are susceptible. Birds are the primary reservoir of the virus in animals. Birds are not just carriers. They also come down with very serious symptoms and often die from the virus itself. The usual mode of transmission to mammals is a mosquito picking up the virus from an infected bird and then moving on to a mammal. There are many different species of mosquito that can transmit the virus. For humans, the best prevention is preventing the spread of mosquitoes by draining pools of water and applying generous amounts of insect repellent with long sleeves and long pants to prevent mosquito bites. Treatment for horses and humans who have come down with the syndrome is mostly palliative. Again, the equine vaccines for West Nile virus is a very good idea. Since transmission is by mosquito, the West Nile fever is seasonal with peak months during the summer. The West Nile virus can be found in all parts of the world since mosquitoes and birds populate most of the continents of the world with the exception of Antarctica.

In humans there are case examples of human to human transmission via blood transfusions or organ transplants. Fetuses can even contract the West Nile virus via intrauterine exposure. Babies can even contract the West Nile virus from breast-feeding. Humans are most susceptible to the virus at the extremes of age such as preschoolers and the elderly. Since we equestrians spend a lot of time in the outdoors, we probably are somewhat more susceptible than the average urban dweller. Certain conditions also predispose to the West Nile virus such as male gender, high blood pressure, and diabetes. There is even a genetic susceptibility to the West Nile virus though it is fairly uncommon. If a human or horse comes down with the syndrome, it is a relatively long convalescence. Unlike most common upper respiratory syndromes, the West Nile virus often takes several months to recover. Again, there is no specific treatment for the West Nile syndrome except supportive measures.

Ron was raised on farms in Washington and Morgan counties by his mother and uncle Randall Simpson. He attended and played football for Akron High School, where his mother was county superintendent of schools, graduating there in 1958. With the diligent assistance of his high school business teacher, who identified his sharp mind for numbers, he was admitted to the University of Denver, where he was a member of the Theta Chi fraternity and graduated from the School of Hotel and Restaurant Management in 1963. He spent his first career as a restaurant equipment salesman, beginning at Carsons, Inc., in downtown Denver. He built his own sales business, Ron Harden & Associates, from the basement of the family home, with "associates" wife Johanna taking sales orders and children Denise and Tyler learning from a young age how to properly answer the business phone. Having built at sales territory spanning from Billings, Montana, west to Salt Lake City, Utah, and south to El Paso, Texas, as well as much of Colorado, he was recruited to represent the Hobart Corporation, where he was a top national salesman for many years. After retiring from Hobart in 2000, Ron taught himself database programming, and developed a horse show management and scoring programs for the Colorado Arabian Horse Club, for which he served as treasurer for many years. His software applications have been used by horse shows across the country, including the Arabian Horse Association U.S. Nationals Show, Scottsdale Arabian Horse Show, and National Western Stock Show.

At the same time, he tinkered with solving a commercial kitchen design issue that had plagued numerous clients over the years, ultimately filing patents for a proprietary magnet system to pull flatware out of dishwasher systems, saving clients tens of thousands of dollars a unit in repair and replacement of damaged disposal systems.

A funeral service will be held at 1:30 pm on Saturday, August 23, at St. Philip in the Field Episcopal Church, followed immediately by burial in the adjacent Bear Cañon Cemetery, both located at 397 North Perry Park Road in Sedalia, Colorado.
